40 Days for Life of Columbia is asking all pro-lifers to please check your calendars, call your friends, bring your children and come to pray on the sidewalk this Thursday, May 26 anytime after 1:00pm. They expect to be there until 7:30 pm or later. As many as 15 women are expected to show up for abortions during this time.

The other bad news is that this new doctor will abort babies up to 13 weeks. This means surgical abortions, which have not been committed here since last summer. God has been listening to our prayers and we are praying for another miracle. *We pray for the conversion of this doctor who will become an abortionist on May 26.*

Notes from Fr. Keith for 5/29/2011

Searching my memories of Memorial Day, it's always struck me that this is an understated holiday. Sure, it's the official beginning of summer, but hot weather's usually here already, and I'm not interested in races in Indiana that much. I remember going to a couple of Memorial Day services as a kid at the local cemetery, but I don't remember more than green grass, bright sunlight and old men in uniforms.

My grandfather was in the Army at the end of World War I, sent on a rather useless mission to Siberia during the Russian Civil War. There were stories in my family about ancestors who were in the Civil War, although none of them involved combat. If you read much about war, it's a living nightmare that nearly no one wants to be part of. This is perhaps what we should remember: those who went into that piece of hell on earth and those who supported them during those times, for the lives they laid down so we could live comfortable lives here and now. The loss was not only lives taken on the battlefield, but lives interrupted and changed by these conflicts.

Reflecting on the sacrifices young men and women made over the years for the sake of our country leaves me rather speechless, and I have heard no words that take the place of this absence adequately except perhaps the Gettysburg Address. Perhaps this is the best tribute we could give those who gave their lives for our country in one way or other: reverent silent respect.
