A Letter from our Bishop on Diocesan Mission Collection

My Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The fifteenth Sunday of ordinary time is always a good time to announce our annual Diocesan Mission Collection. The readings are messages of mission and evangelization. Last year the Gospel was the story of the Good Samaritan and the year before it was Jesus sending out the Twelve to preach and minister.

Today we hear the parable of the sower and the seed. In countless homilies we have been urged to find ourselves in that story. Are we the rocky ground with hearts too hardened to nourish the Word or are we the deep rich soil that bears abundant fruit? Today, however, I would like you to think of yourself, not as the seed, but the sower.

We are all called to spread the Good News of Jesus and his Church. One of the ways we do this is through our mission outreach. For almost 50 years we have sown the seeds of our faith among the poor of Peru. Recently, our field has grown larger as we have expanded to mission projects across Latin America and into Africa. For the first time this year, we will also be providing some small aid to the Church of Central and Eastern Europe.

The seeds we sow are food, medical assistance, education, formation and parish support. In the context of faith, though, they are much more than programs or money. We are sowing hope among the hopeless, love among the lonely, and community among the rejected and forgotten.

Next weekend, please be as generous as possible in our special collection for the diocesan missions. Remember, it is in the Kingdom as it is in the garden: the flowers of tomorrow are the seeds we plant today.

Once in a while, someone asks me what I think of the 2012 predictions. I have an easy, one word answer: balderdash. People have been predicting the end of the world since Jesus returned to Heaven, and no one's been right yet. Given the fact that no one has figured out Nostradamus' predictions before they supposedly happen, and that all the Mayan calendar does is end its cycle next year (the surviving Mayans say it doesn't mean it the end), I see no compelling evidence the world is going to end soon any more than when I grew up in the missile fields during the Cold War.

There are lots of folks who read Scripture claiming to know it's coming soon, but I always take Matthew 24:36-44 as my guide: we don't know when, but we're supposed to be ready anytime. I always wonder how the doomsayers will profit from what they say; I try to live each day at a time with the realization one of them will be the last. When that happens, we'll be with Jesus forever, and there's nothing better than that. So why worry?
